



FACT SHEET 1

Things to Know: Session I





1862, the Morril Act, mandated "Land Grant" colleges to develop programs so all people would have education. In Oklahoma it was established in Stillwater. The Morril Act of 1890 established "Land Grant" colleges for Black Students. In Oklahoma, Langston University was established. also established was the United State Department of Agriculture.

- "Land Grant" meant that Congress granted parcels of land to each state for:
 - 1) experimental farms for agricultural research, and
 - 2) to sell land to fund "Extension-Outreach" programs.
- 1887 the Hatch Act established the ag experiment stations.
- Farmers were afraid to try new methods of agriculture because they might fail. Extension Agents and public educators turned to the youth. They were educated about new agriculture and soil procedures.
- The Corn clubs for boys and Canning clubs for girls were the forerunners of the modern 4-H Club. Oklahoma 4-H can be traced back to 1909, a corn club in Tishomingo.
- 1914 the Smith-lever Act established the Cooperative Extension Service System.
- The motto "To Make the Best Better" was selected to explain how members learn about their projects.
- In 1911 the Four Leaf Clover symbol was chosen. The clover represents the equal training of the Head, Heart, Hands and Health. Members learn through their involvement in project and clubs.
- The Four Leaf Clover replaced the three-leaf emblem after World War I.
- The first National 4-H Congress was held in 1922. The first National 4-H Camp (today known as National 4-H Conference) was in 1927.
- The national pledge and motto were approved in 1927. The word, "Our World" was added to the pledge in the 1970's.
- 4-H moved to other countries after World War II.
 International Farm Youth (IFEY) began in 1948. 80 countries have 4-H like organizations.
- National 4-H Center was opened in 1959 at Chevy Chase, Maryland in Washington D.C.

FACT SHEET 2

Things to Know: Session II

- The five focus areas of Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development are: Health and Wellness, Natural Resources and Environmental Education, Science and Technology, Family Strengths, and Leadership.
- 4-H membership is open to all youth between the ages of 9 and 19.
- Youth ages 5 to 8 years old are called Cloverbuds. The Cloverbud program is a non-competitive educational activity for children.
- 18 percent of the 4-H members live on farms, 31 percent live in towns under 10,000; 25 percent live in towns between 10,000 and 50,000 and 7 percent live in suburbs and 19 percent live in large cities
- The Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service contracts with County Commissioners to maintain offices in each of the Oklahoma counties.
- All Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service employees are faculty and/or staff of Oklahoma State University.
- Cooperative Extension represents a partnership between federal, state and local government.
- The primary purpose of the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service is education. Clubs and groups are the vehicle for delivering the information.
- Volunteers are important assets to 4-H. Volunteers are responsible for providing guidance, support, and training to 4-H membership.
- An ambassador always looks their best. They represent 4-H with pride.
- An ambassador arrives on time. In fact they plan to be 10-15 minutes early so that they can double check the plan of their engagement.
- Good etiquette and manners are important to an ambassador. Ambassadors do not have anything in their mouth like gum, candy, or breath mints during meetings, speeches, or other engagements. They answer with respect and sincerity.
- A first impression is made within 8 seconds, basically a blink of an eye! Ninety (90%) percent of that first impression is based on appearance.
- 4-H School Enrichment Programs are for classroom teachers or volunteers working with youth. A variety of subjects have been developed for short term educational use. The materials can be taught as a unit or used to supplement materials already being taught. Programs provide teachers' guides, visuals and equipment.
