
- An interactive informational section

What you should know about experiential learning. The online modules introduced youth to information and activities that are arranged in a unique, experiential format. Experiential Learning allows youth to be introduced to a particular practice, idea, or piece of information through an opening (1) experience. The member then (2) shares what he or she did with the project helper and (3) processes the experience and knowledge through a series of questions that allow the youth to

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Background

Did you•know the process of getting food from the farm gate to your plate is a complex one? Every five years, a piece of legislation is passed that is commonly called the Farm Bill. Originally started in the Dust Bowl, the first Farm Bill was The Agricultural Act of 1933. It helped agricultural commodity markets by offering financial support to farmers. Today, this bill provides risk protection to food producers, finds new markets for excess agricultural production, enhances conservation, and gets food to limited resource families and individuals

Objectives:

By completing this virtual curriculum, youth from 7th to 12th grade will learn about key milestones of the farm bill and how it is affects farmers, ranchers and rural families today.

- **Lesson 1**: Identify milestones in the Farm Bill's history.
- Lesson 2: Describe the different steps required to pass a Farm Bill into law
- **Lesson 3**: Understand structure and purpose of the USDA and explain the USDA's role as it relates to the Farm Bill.
